

Caring for Your New Succulent Plants

Succulents come from many parts of the world and belong to different families, so check with an expert for care instructions for new plants.

□ Watering

Most cacti and other succulents that resemble cacti come from very dry areas. They can survive with little water, but most will not thrive or even live for long in soil that is wet and soggy. For the first few weeks, spray lightly when the sun is not on the plants. Once established and growing, they need regular thorough watering.

□ Sunshine

Succulent plants may sunburn; most will acclimate to bright light, but prefer some shade, particularly when first purchased or moved from a shaded location to one that is more exposed.

□ Temperature

Protect your plants from frost. While many will survive freezing weather, most will die when frozen, and others may not survive temperatures below 50° F (10° C).

□ Soil and Potting

Use well-drained soil in a pot with a hole in the bottom. Half coarse sand and half garden soil is adequate, but most growers create their own soil mixtures with various combinations of mineral and organic components. Transplant when plants are dormant, and withhold water for a few days after transplanting.

□ Fertilizers and Insecticides

Succulent plants occasionally attract bugs. The best way to avoid them is through good housekeeping and generous ventilation. Avoid excessive use of fertilizers and insecticides, and seek advice from successful growers. Background
